

Gables High Leads County In Merit Semifinalists

Twenty National Merit Scholarship Semifinalists were named from Coral Gables High on the morning of September 27. There was a total of 48 semifinalists from all the schools in Dade County. No school other than Gables has more than four.

Their naming came as a result of outstanding performance on the National Merit Qualifying Test administered last spring. The students are: Barry Boyer, Brant Brown, Jack Catlin, Martin

Cohen, Stephen Dubrow, Jan Faber, Robert H. Frank, Mitchell Fruitstone, Edith Genung, Carol Geenfeld.

Lee Groth, Roger Hess, Allen Imerstein, Michael Machtey, George McLain, Robert J. Potts, David Rimland, David Tripp, Anthony Wasserman, and James Young.

Coral Gables High produced twelve semifinalists as well as finalists, last year. Two of these went on to win \$1500 stipends to

Harvard and California Institute of Technology.

These students are among 10,000 seniors throughout the country who attained semifinalist status. This group is composed of the highest scoring students in each state of the United States.

To increase their opportunities to obtain financial aid, the Merit Corporation sends the names of semifinalists to all accredited colleges and universities and to other scholarship granting agen-

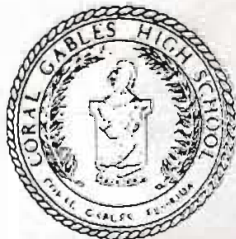
cies. Studies show that about 50 percent of the semifinalists obtain scholarship assistance from sources other than the Merit Program.

The next step toward becoming a Merit Finalist will come on December 2 when all semifinalists take the Scholastic Aptitude Test of the College Entrance Examination Board. Those whose scores on the second test substantiate their performance on the qualifying test and who are en-

dorsed by their high schools will become finalists. In the past, more than 97 percent of the semifinalists have become finalists.

As finalists, the students will be eligible for scholarship awards from 130 business corporations, foundations, associations, individuals, and the National Merit Scholarship Corporation itself. The awards from the Merit Corporation, while averaging about \$800 a year, range from \$100 to \$1500.

Service Club Membership Frozen Until Mid-October

Service Club membership has been frozen until October 20, when the Dade County School Board makes a final decision on how these organizations may select their new members. There seems to be little peril as to the existence of these clubs as each continued their activities, only omitting the traditional tapping of new members.

Student Activities Director, William Byrd, addressed a joint meeting of the four Gables High Service Clubs with their senior civic club directors at school on September 18. The purpose of this meeting was to clarify many of the misconceptions formed by service club members about the legality of their membership selection practices. These questions were deeply rooted in local newspaper publicity concerning certain illegal fraternities outside of Gables High but associated with our student body.

Mr. Byrd made it clear service club meetings would have to "conform to the letter of the law." The following week the school board set the October 20 deadline.

The Florida State law stipends that no one enrolled in a public high school may be a member of an organization that selects its own membership. It makes exceptions to this rule in the case of clubs sponsored by The Knights of Pythias, Elks, Masons, etc.

In order to prepare for future changes in policy, the following rules, in addition to the freezing of membership, were announced:

1. The old service point system, in which clubs were given points for club projects is abolished. From now on this will be handled on an individual basis, in which service hours will be awarded to each member. A total of 25 service hours will be required to retain membership.

2. Regular club meetings will be held at 3:30 p. m., rather than 7:30 p. m. as in the past. A number of local high schools already follow this policy.

3. The senior civic club sponsors (Kiwanis, Rotary, Civitan, and Exchange) are to be directly involved with the club activities in order to curb noisy and pointless meetings.

Sophs Learn Driving

Driver education is compulsory for Gables High sophomores for the first time in school history this year. New students at Gables High have found themselves spending three homeroom periods a week learning how to drive safely through a combination television and behind-the-wheel course.

In order to accommodate the program, three new teachers were hired: Michael Kynn, Charles Allbury, and E. Kal Manning. The ground sections around the band room and gymnasium have been paved and leveled to make way for the additional driver ed. cars.

A new building behind the gymnasium has been constructed that will provide storage space as well as a classroom for the driver ed. students and a visual classroom for physical education students.

Enrollment Surpasses 3,000 Mark

Enrollment at Coral Gables High School surpassed the 3,000 mark for the first time in the school's history. The phenomenal increase resulted in a great many changes at the "School of Distinction."

Opening day saw Principal Harry N. Rath address the student body, asking that they cooperate in the task of keeping order in the congested halls, and make the best of crowded conditions in class rooms. The first day hun-

dreds of students piled up at school exits to the gymnasium and auditorium each period and equally stagnant traffic occurred in front of each study hall.

The problems resulting from such an increase are many, and every member of the student body and faculty has been called upon to alleviate poor conditions.

Mr. Rath announced an expansion of the faculty. This called for 125 teachers and counselors, three librarians, and four

executives. The executives are formally listed as Harry N. Rath, principal; former Dean of Boys, Mr. Edward Cook, assistant principal for administration; former Dean of Girls, Mrs. Louise Stewart, assistant principal for guidance; and Mr. Joseph DeChurch, assistant principal for curriculum.

From the total of 125 teachers, 34 are new to the school and two others were only hired temporarily during second semester last year.

The total of secretaries is now eight. Mrs. Agnes Ewald has assumed one of the more perplexing posts, that of registrar for Cuban students in the local area. She has the task of processing students for schools throughout Miami. Three Cuban teachers have been hired to help her handle the language barrier with the prospective students and their parents.

Overcrowding of classrooms has been a problem which Gables High knew it would have to face, and now has finally encountered. Before school began many fears were expressed about the expanded faculty and increased enrollment. It was realized that for the first time, every classroom would be used during every period. There wouldn't even be a room for student government meetings. To further add to the dilemma, there was the rebuilding of the arts and crafts room behind the cafeteria. Construction would still be going on when school started, leaving a number of students homeroom-less.

Now that school has reached its fourth week we can observe these problems and our methods of coping with them. The addition of TV classes has helped remove an awesome burden from the teachers.

The final effort, to date, to help the faculty came only last week when Student Activities Director, William Byrd, announced the hiring of eight new teachers. This has served greatly in remedying the problems of an overcrowded school striving to meet the challenge of instructional quality with a degree of success.

Securing Scholarships Your Duty

"Securing a scholarship is essentially the individual responsibility of the student," emphasized Mrs. Joanna Woltz of the Coral Gables High guidance department. Just moments before Principal Harry N. Rath had stated that students must be "alert" if they wished to earn financial aid to the college of their choice.

Students who graduated last year from Gables High were rewarded a total of \$500,000 in scholarships. A total of 70 students, 48 boys and 22 girls, shared in the funds. More than \$360,000 was accepted since students who received two scholarships selected the one they preferred.

The grants came from such schools as Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Dartmouth, California Institute of Technology, Georgia Tech, Duke, Carnegie Tech, Chicago, Sophie Newcom, and Vassar.

Now is the time for all stu-

dents at Coral Gables High, whether they're sophomores, juniors, or seniors, to begin preparations to secure a financial reward for themselves. Our guidance department placed scholarship information at your disposal through bulletins, but only each individual student can take the necessary steps to secure the grant-in-aids.

There are many scholarships available for those students who have scholastic ability and a good academic record or who demonstrate special talents in such fields as sports, journalism, debate, dramatics, art, music, etc. Sophomores and juniors should bring their grades up to the highest level possible. They should also secure information about scholarships from the colleges in which they are interested. It is advisable for juniors who wish to get scholarships to take College Board tests in March.

Gables Stadium To Be Abandoned

Over the summer about \$5,000 worth of repairs were put into the Coral Gables Stadium. Most of the money was expended for repairs to the wooden bleachers, which were damaged by Hurricane Donna. A small portion of the playing field also improved. No addition was made to the seating capacity which was proven inadequate during the Palmetto game. This was done because there are no future plans for the stadium. It is due to be abandoned at the end of next season. The county, which is building a series of stadiums throughout Dade, intends to build a new stadium in the Southwest section which Coral Gables is slated to use. The proposed abandonment of the stadium is a shame. It is waste of tax payers' money. No matter how much money is poured into a new stadium, it will not be as good as the present stadium could be, with the same money spent on improvements. The Coral Gables Stadium is used by four high schools (Coral Gables, Southwest, Palmetto, and Christopher Columbus). It is convenient for most students. There is absolutely no reason to abandon it, especially under the guise of progress.

Halfback Ted Sauselle Transfers To Mizzou

Ted Sauselle, one of Gables more illustrious football alumni, as of late has been the center of a mild stir as to where he was going to pursue his football future. In his senior year at Gables Sauselle was constantly compared to Lindy Infante of Miami High who is now a star halfback at the University of Florida. Sauselle was All-State that year and was the county's leading scorer. He then matriculated at the University of Miami.

Throughout his Miami career, Sauselle was never considered a top-notch performer. In spring practice this year he was placed on the fourth and fifth teams. He did not show up at the beginning of this season. Sauselle has decided to transfer to the University of Missouri where he feels his talents will be better appreciated.

High School Athletic Program Revised

This past summer Mr. Robert Wilson, Director of Senior High Schools, in Dade County was named Athletic Director for the Senior High Schools. His overall responsibility as Athletic Director will be to coordinate and improve the athletic programs of the county's various high schools.

Mr. Wilson will be responsible for approving all athletic schedules, approving budgets and budget amendments, and coordinating the purchasing department. The purchasing department will be responsible for all items costing over \$100. All other items will be approved by the principals.

To provide aid for schools which might be in financial distress an assessment has been placed on all athletic receipts. The assessment will be 1/2 of 1 per cent on the first \$10,000 of adjusted gross receipts and an additional 1/2 per cent on each additional \$10,000.

This new setup should have no great affect on Gables' athletic policy. It should, however, improve the equipment and facilities of our athletic teams.

To date, the Cavalier football team has at best been unbalanced, with the defense completely overshadowing the offense. However, in the North Miami game, the offense showed signs of emerging from their frustrating inability to move the ball. The backfield, inexperienced at the beginning of the year, has started to mesh.

Kotys Molds Team In Decade Here

During the last ten years, Gables has become one of the state's top football powers. Its rise may be attributed to Coach Nick Kotys, who came to Gables in 1952.

Kotys played his college football at Villanova College. Later, he coached at Pottsville High in Pottsville, Pennsylvania. His great success there drew the attention of the great Herman Hickman of Yale. Kotys was an assistant under Hickman until he left for Gables in 1952.

His first season was a successful one as Gables posted a 6-3 record. In 1953, Gables beat a Big 3 team (Jackson) for the first time. In 1954, the Cavaliers tied Miami High. Finally, in 1956, Gables won the state championship. Mike Harrison was Gables' first and only All American the same year. Last year, Bruce Fischer and Dick Rutecky were all southern.

Dance Class Underway

Cavs Rip Palmetto Panthers 28-0 In 1961 Debut At Gables Stadium

The 1961 Cavaliers opened their season with a 28-0 victory over Palmetto Friday night, September 15, in the Gables Stadium. The difference was the Cavaliers' staunch defense and second half offense.

The first Cavalier score came in the second period after a Hasencamp to Ed Maynard pass when Jack Card plunged into the end zone from the four. Hasencamp's kick was good. Gables led 7-0 at halftime.

The offense uncoiled in the second half. Dennis Davis intercepted a pass at the 24 and ran it back 14 yards. Two plays later, Jim Knight went over for the

score. Hasencamp converted--Gables 14, Palmetto 0.

Two minutes later, end Steve Buzzel scored on a 30 yard pass from Hasencamp. Robb's conversion made it 21-0.

Harold Skipper added the Cavs final touchdown on a two yard dive play set up by Larry Blume's interception. Skip Searle made it 28-0.

"Players of the Week" under Coach Kotys percentage scoring system were Tom Swilley, offensive line; Chappie Cesarano, defensive back; Jack Card, defensive line; and sophomore Harold Skipper, offensive backfield.

Jack Card was the one ray of light on the offensive platoon. Blume ripped through North Miami on a number of fine runs, but unfortunately a lot of them ended in fumbles.

Card was also a standout on defense as were tackles Joel Goldman and John Douglas.

Meanwhile, at the Orange Bowl, the next Crimson and Gray opponent, the Tigers of Jacksonville Jackson, fell victim to a last period Miami High deluge, bowing 33-13.

Edison Beats J.V.

Gable's Junior Varsity fell victim to the Miami Edison baby Red Raiders 32-6 at Curtis Park on September 27. Gable's only touchdown came on a pass by Quarterback Larry Davidson to Jack Lamb.

The team, however, is looking forward to their contest against Miami High October 4 at Curtis Park. The game will be at night with a 7:30 kickoff.

Red Raiders Defense Smothers Cavs Edison Whips Sluggish Cavaliers

Miami Edison's hard rocked defense completely stymied the Cavalier's inexperienced offense Friday night September 22 in the Orange Bowl.

Edison drove 70 yards after the opening kickoff for their first score. Halfbacks Bob Ashworth and Bob Chandler ran right through the Gable's defense with ease, the only time they were able to all evening. Chandler bulled into the end zone from the three. Barry Nickerson's conversion try was wide.

Little halfback Jim Knight ran back the ensuing kickoff 65 yards to the Edison 20. Knight used the same play as he did in his penalty-nullified touchdown run against Palmetto. However, indicative of the night's performance, the offense was unable

to move the ball.

After scoreless second and third periods, completely frustrating from the Gable's point of view, Edison started moving again in the fourth period. Halfback Chandler scored his second touchdown of the night on a 23 yard jaunt. Sparkplugging the drive was injured Edison quarterback Pete Kiernan making his first appearance of the night.

Coach Kotys has found the answer to his acute punting problem in Robb Hasencamp. Hasencamp boomed out two long punts in the second half.

The Gables offense was at best anemic. A lot of work must be done before the Crimson and Gray can return to the victory column.





Television Enters Gables High

T. V. History and English are the two newly featured courses this year that have caused the most comment among students.

Both subjects have approximately 30 minutes of T. V. instruction per day.

The auditorium has 12 television sets and seats about 300 pupils each period. Each section has a teacher, although only one acts as "spokesman" conducting the review and answering any questions.

When a student has a question, he writes it down, hands it in to a teacher in the lobby and waits for it to be answered on stage in a day or so.

The penalty for being late once is a 3 hour detention served one hour a day for 3 consecutive days. Failure to show to "serve your time" results in a suspension. Warning--gum chewing, talking or bad posture are not healthy either.

Acoustics Improved In Auditorium

Acoustic problems, always a major objection to the Gables High auditorium, have finally been curbed.

During the summer months accoustical material, easily seen by those in the auditorium, was placed in alternating squares on the ceiling, wall, and balcony paneling. The strip across the front of the balcony is the most effective in improvement of acoustical conditions.

The problems in the auditorium arose from the fact that the ceiling and walls were all made

of hard wood. These surfaces are undesirable since they cause the sound to bounce throughout the auditorium, making it impossible to understand what is being said. The new material is designed to cushion or absorb the sound, thereby cutting down on the echoes and other distracting noises.

This is a partial solution to the long-existing problem. A further solution will come when a new system is set up with the overhead fans. Vibrations from the fans in the ceiling are now directed straight down at the audience. Plans are to move them into ducts where they will still circulate air throughout the au-

ditorium, but will not direct the rattle and noises into the building.

The auditorium has long been the problem child of Coral Gables High. Prior to completion in 1954, it struggled through a number of minor and major construction battles. The most severe of these came midway through construction when the entire auditorium set-up was redesigned. Originally started as a ring theatre, such as the University of Miami's, it was decided to make it as it now stands. with the stage down front. This complete change after construction had already begun is a major reason for the acoustic problem.

Zame Honored At Cal. Tech

William Zame, Salutatorian at Coral Gables High last year, was named as receiving Honors at Entrance at the California Institute of Technology. He was one of twelve entering freshmen accorded the high honor.

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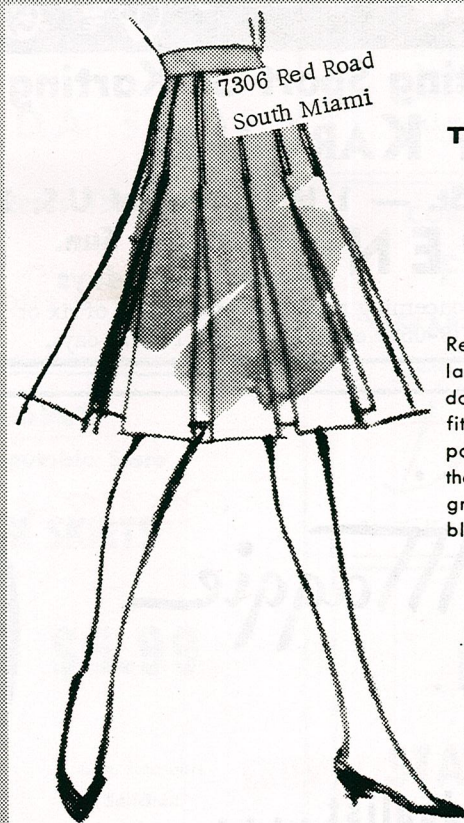
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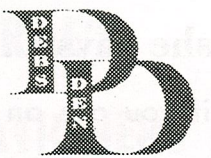
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
