Prizes Awarded As Gables Science Fair Opens

Science fair competition will begin and reach a climax today at Coral Gables Senior High as students compete in the annual fair in rooms 609 and 610. Gables students and the general public are invited to visit the fair today from 1:00 P. M. to 7:15 P. M. and tomorrow from 7:15 A. M. to 3:45 P. M.

The math and physical science projects will be placed in room 610 and biological science in 609. Judging will take place today from 11:30 A.M. to 12:30 P.M.

Projects that are awarded prizes of superior and excellent in the competition today will compete in the District Science Fair March 23-25. Students competing there will be eligible for prizes of \$300 and \$100 as well as \$900 scholarships. The grand prize is a 10 day all expense paid tour of Spain and Portugal. This prize is sponsored by the Miami Herald and Parade Magazine, the magazine that often accompanies issues of the HIGH LIGHTS.

Last year's grand prize, also a tour of Europe, was won by Gables student Mike Zinner.

The District Fair is sponsored by the University of Miami and the Miami Herald in cooperation with the Dade County Science Teachers Association and the Dade County Council of Teachers of Mathematics.

of Science and Math Honor Society and as treasurer of the Literary Society. Mike is a Merit Scholarship Semi-finalist and one of the school's four members of the Westinghouse Science Talent Search's Top Forty.

Science-Mitchell Fruitstone has shown a high aptitude for science since junior high when he served as president of the science club at Ponce Junior High. At Gables he has been named as one of the Top Forty in the Westinghouse competition and is a Merit Scholarship Semi-finalist. Mitch is also vice president of Chemistry Club.

General Scholarship-Jack Catlin brings a straight A average and a string of 99 percentiles on tests as his credentials in the most rugged of the Silver Knight categories. He is a Merit Semi-finalist and one of the Top Forty in the Westinghouse competition. Jack also serves as president of National Honor Society and is a member of Science and Math Honor Society and Doctorate Associative Researchers Society.

The awards are given on the basis of outstanding achievement, leadership and character. Each nominee submits a portfolio or scrapbook showing his accomplishment in these three areas.

The winners are announced on May 10 at Dade County Auditorium. Those winning their category receive a trophy and \$200. Three runners-up in each category are given plaques and \$50. All nominees are given certificates and a Silver Knight pin.

In last year's competition, Coral Gables students took top honors in General Scholarship Science, Math, and Social Science. Gables students also placed as runners-up in Foreign Language, Athletics, and Music.

Last summer two students from the Bronx School of Science were working at the University of Miami Marine Biology Laboratory where many of the Westinghouse students were preparing their projects. The students boasted of their school's superiority in science and made game of Gables' attempts to place more students in the Westinghouse Honors Group competition.

Mr. Bowlby rose to the occasion and bet the boys that Gables would have more winners than Bronx.

The score stood at 13-9 Gables' favor when the winners were announced. A \$5.00 bill arrived in the mail addressed to Mr. Bowlby a few days later.

Gables Student Age Poll Reveals 13-21 Age Range

Principal Harry N. Rath recently announced the results of the age poll taken in the homerooms last month. Some of the results proved surprising to many faculty members.

The poll revealed that sixteen sophomores are only 13, while one is eighteen.

The poll, which surveyed 2942 Gables students, also revealed that one senior student is 21 while five others are 20.

The other results of the poll are: in 10th grade there are 16 thirteen year olds, 409 fourteen year olds, 599 fifteen year olds, 101 sixteen year olds, 9 seventeen year olds and 1 eighteen or more year olds; in 11th grade there is 1 thirteen year old, 22 fourteen year olds, 297 fifteen year olds, 512 sixteen year olds, 74 seventeen year olds and 8 eighteen or more year olds; in 12th grade there are no thirteen or fourteen year olds, 9 fifteen year olds, 331 sixteen year olds, 496 seventeen year olds and 57 eighteen or more year olds.


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Cavs Rout Jackson Revenge Early Loss

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The Sports Scope

Twice during the 1962 basketball players in the Greater Miami area have had been hurt to the extent that were taken to the hospital. Only one boy however was admitted. Basketball, however, is supposed to be a non-contact game.

A situation like this is most likely to occur when a game gets out of control. When a basketball game gets out of control it is invariably the referees fault.

The last Coral Gables Southwest game, which the Cavaliers lost 52-50 in the closing seconds, at Southwest was one of these games that got out of control. The fault was totally with the referees.

The referees let the game get out of control by failing to call a large number of personal fouls. Whether they missed them or did not consider them serious enough is highly questionable. Either way however they were wrong. Most of the uncalled fouls were both serious enough and obvious to be called.

By not calling a fairly close game the referees do the participants a great injustice and place them in danger. When fouls are misesd a game becomes rough and if the roughness is not checked the danger of somebody getting hurt increases. As the temper quickens and the tempers grow the chances of deliberate fouling and of fights is made great. That is when someone gets hurt.

A situation such as this existed during the game in question. Between a bad refereeing job and a boysterous pro-Southwest crowd tempers were high and the game went out of control. One member of the Gables coaching staff remarked as he left, "Its lucky somebody didn't get hurt out there."

Improvement Is Needed

The big cause of situations like this is the poor quality of referees assigned to high schools games. The referees are assigned by the South Florida referees group.

To become a referee a person must apply to the Florida High School Athletic Association to be certified. Certification requires no knowledge or competancy in refereeing. The applicant then takes a small test given by the South Florida referees association. Upon passing the test he is eligible to be assigned to referee games.

Each coach of the opposing teams in high school basketball game has the right to one official. However, in many instances neither of the requested referees are assigned. They are assigned by the referees association.

Control Of Referees Is Non-existent

Many changes have to be made in the refereeing situation. Qualifications needed to become a referee must be made much higher.

The referees association which is autonomous in a way similar to the F.H.S.A.A. is controlled only by itself. Some system of control must created so that only qualified officials are assigned. At the present time coaches can only complain about the referees. This usually does absolutely no good.

Until this situation is completely corrected high school basketball players will continue to be injured unnecessarily in high school games.


