Student Government representatives during the last two meetings have vigorously debated and discussed the hall congestion problems inherent in a school with the enrollment of ours. These debates have been ineffectual and unproductive

But it is a waste of time for the student government to spend all of its time, and the time of its representatives, in attempting to reach a solution on this one isolated issue.

Therefore, we should seek an answer to the hall problem in a vigorous, determined, and expedient manner. What can be done to finally resolve the issue?

Why doesn't the Student Government take all the suggestions from the homerooms, process and list them for the representatives, and then present them in a meeting along with an evaluation from the cabinet? This would allow everyone to express his thoughts at one time rather than periodically throughout the year.

The way things are now going, the hall problem will be presented at every meeting from now until June. Let's complete this business now and devote our time to other things.







The Sports Scope

Lockhart Stadium in Fort Lauderdale is an example of what a high school stadium should look like. The stands are concrete. There are no holes or weak boards that can at times be very disturbing. The lighting at Lockhart is remarkable. Lockhart has an asphalt track around the outside of the playing field. In past years, it has been the site of the Dade County regional track meet.

At the end of next season, the county plans to abandon the Gables Stadium in favor of a new stadium which will be part of a countywide system. The new stadium, which will be built on a new site, is a definite waste of the taxpayers' money. The cost of acquiring new property that will have as convenient a site as the present stadium could be prohibitive. The cost of putting in a new playing field could be almost as prohibitive.

The Gables Stadium has been sarcastically called "The Garbage Bowl" and "The Cow Pasture." These adjectives do to a great extent describe the stadium. However, with the money that would be spent on the new stadium, our stadium could be put to a better use.

Why can't the county take the money alloted for the new stadium in the southwest section and use it to make the Gables Stadium into something that this area can be proud of?

Coach Kotys Elected To Mon Valley Hall Of Fame

Gables head football coach and athletic director, Nick Kotys, has been chosen for induction into the Mon Valley Sports Hall Of Fame. The Mon Valley includes the valley area around Monessen, Pennsylvania, south of Pittsburgh.

At press time, Coach Kotys did not know whether or not he would attend the ceremony on December 6, when he will be presented with an appropriate plaque. Mr. Kotys considers this honor as a very great one. Coaches Rip Engle of Penn State and Wayne Hardin of Navy will be the speakers at the presentation.

Coach Kotys graduated from Monessen High in 1932. He played left halfback on offense and safety on defense for the Greyhounds, and made All-WPIAL (Western Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic League) and All-State. The most famous of his contemporaries was John Michelosen of Ambridge High. Michelosen is now head football coach at The University of Pittsburgh where he has a lifetime contract.







New College Guidance Book Is Available For Students

The American Legion's educational and scholarship handbook, "Need A Lift?", containing information about hundreds of college and vocational school scholarships for qualified high school students in this area has been presented by Lindley De Garmo, Unit #70 of the American Legion Auxiliary.

This revised publication for the year 1961-62 is recognized as one of the most complete sources of career and scholarship information in the United States. The handbook does not limit its listings to children of Veterans but contains scholarships and educational aids which are available to all students.

Mrs. Osborn Grimstad, Education and Scholarship Chairman, Lindley DeGarmo Unit, stated that thousands of young people have not taken advantage of the generous educational aids which are available due to a failure to plan early for their future education

She mentioned in particular the Junior GI Bill which provides up to \$110 per month for four years of educational help for sons and daughters of veterans who lost their lives as the result of military service. Over half of the young people eligible for this help have failed to apply.

Experience has proven that plans for higher education should begin during the student's sophomore year in high school. "The boy or girl who starts considering career and scholarship sources early, is the one with the best chance of going on to school, she said

Parents and students are encouraged to make use of the copies of "Need A Lift?" provided as a service to the community. The publication, prepared by the American Legion's Education and Scholarship program, National Americanism Division in Indianapolis is now in its 11th edition with distribution of more than a half a million copies since its first issue in 1951.
